Slide 5: What is human rights education?	As stated in the UN Declaration on Human Rights Education and Training (2011), Human Rights Education promotes values, beliefs and attitudes that encourage all individuals to understand and uphold their own rights and those of others. It contributes to ensuring that the rights of all persons are valued, respected and protected.
Slide 6: What does HRE include?	<ul> <li>Education <i>about</i> human rights, which includes providing knowledge and understanding of human rights norms and principles, the values that underpin them and the mechanisms for their protection;</li> <li>Education <i>through</i> human rights, which includes learning and teaching in a way that respects the rights of both educators and learners;</li> <li>Education <i>for</i> human rights, which includes empowering persons to enjoy and exercise their rights and to respect and uphold the rights of others.<sup>1</sup> (United Nations Declaration on HRET 2011)</li> </ul>

Slide 8: Why human rights education is important in displacement?	<ul> <li>It is a key tool to enhance protection of human rights of affected populations</li> <li>It can address and tackle racism and discrimination that can be a cause of displacement and affects IDPs.</li> </ul>
Slide 9: Who HRE can empower?	<ul> <li>In this context, HRE can empower:</li> <li>Humanitarian actors to adopt a human rights-based approach to their work, protect human rights and encourage duty-bearers to meet their obligations. HRE in this sense includes training programs for humanitarian actors on human rights standards, mechanisms and engagement.</li> </ul>
	Rights-holders, especially populations in situations of vulnerability, to claim and realize their rights and engage in relevant decision- making processes. Everyone has the right to know, seek and re- ceive information about all human rights and
Slide 10: Practical examples	Commission on Human Rights – Republic of the Philippines - The goal is to empower IDPs by ensuring they have knowledge about their rights. The strategy includes creating community-based networks, coordinating with IDP leaders and integrating different human rights topics. Slide 12: How can the PC engage with HRE?	<ul> <li>Needs analysis and developing a HRE strategy which is context specific.</li> <li>Sensitization and raising awareness activities with the communities</li> <li>Engage with different stakeholders including with National Human Rights Institutions (NHRIs) and civil society.</li> </ul>
